Program of Study

It's four-year undergraduate program: the minimum length of stay in the program is four calendar years. However, the maximum time for complete of a bachelor's degree is within six years. This time limit is counted from the time that the students enter the undergraduate program regardless of any leave of absence taken. A student must obtain 130 credits in order to complete the Bachelor's program.

Admission

The requirements for the admission to Bachelor's programs are as follows:

• An applicant must have a secondary school or high school certificate. Education should normally consist of a minimum of 12 years of study.

• An applicant must present transcripts from your graduation diploma or certificate, and any graduation exam results. Applications for admission are reviewed as soon as all required documents are received.

• English Language Proficiency

One of the following: TOEFL iBT (internet based) test result of at least 80 points - TOEFL (computer based) test result of at least 213 points -TOEFL (paper based) test result of at least 550 points - IELTS test result of at least 6.0. This requirement does not apply to an applicant who has studied for at least two years at, or received a degree from an English speaking college or university.

> The possession of the minimum entrance requirements does not guarantee that every qualified applicant will be offered admission. The Undergraduate Admissions Committee takes several factors into consideration in assessing the eligibility of an applicant for admission into the program.



The University of International Business and Economics (UIBE), situated in China's capital city Beijing, was founded in 1951 as the Beijing Institute of Foreign Trade. In 1960 it was designated as a "key university" by the government for its outstanding programs. In May 1997 UIBE was put on the list of "Project 211" universities, a governmental program aimed at turning about 100 Chinese universities into exceptionally high quality academic institutions in the new century. By the year 2000, UIBE had become one of the state universities under the leadership of the Ministry of Education, and in June of the same year it merged with China Institute of Finance and has since become one of the leaders in the studies of business, economics and finance,

UIBE consists of over 20 academic schools, departments and research centers. Among the over 80 bachelor, master and doctoral programs that UIBE offers, International Trade, International Economic Law, English Language and International Business Management have been designated as key programs under "Project 211."

In December 1989, UIBE became the first university in China with a Board of Trustees comprised of members from the Ministry of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation, Bank of China, People's Insurance Company of China, Hong Kong Chamber of Commerce, and others. Li Lanqing, the former Vice–Premier of the State Council, took the chair for its first session, and Wu Yi, Vice–Premier of the State Council, chaired the Board for its second session. At present, UIBE has a total enrollment of more than 20,000 students coming from 30 provinces, autonomous regions and municipalities in China as well as over 90 countries and regions in the world. The university invites dozens of foreign academic professionals to teach or lecture every year in addition to its 1,400 teaching and administrative staff members who carry out its regular curricula.

UIBE is one of the first universities in China to have initiated academic exchanges with foreign academic institutions. Currently UIBE has exchange programs with over 100 universities and institutes in more than 30 countries or regions among the world.

In the past few decades, UIBE has been proud of the performance of its graduates, many of whom now play active roles in promoting business and economic cooperation between China and other countries. UIBE welcomes more and more outstanding candidates to join its programs and enjoy a bright future in the new century.

Location & Transportation

University of Intentional Business and Economics (UIBE) is situated in the Northeastern part of Beijing's Chaoyang District. The University is about 20 km away from the Beijing International Airport. By taxi cab from the Airport, the fare is about 75 Yuan (including 10 Yuan tolls). Several bus companies provide shuttle service at the airport; the shuttle fare is about 20 Yuan. UIBE students enjoy convenient public transportation service. A number of bus lines (No. 62, No.201, No. 406, No.361, No. 119, No.376, No.419, No.422, No.479, No.602, No.684, No.984) run close to the Campus and can take passengers to the subway, directly downtown or to transfer locations where students can easily switch to buses covering almost all of Beijing. The Beijing Railway station and Beijing Railway Station West are the two most important train stations in Beijing. The Beijing Railway station, located at the city center, is about 10 km from the University. The subway fare is 2 Yuan. Beijing Railway West, built in 1992, is about 22 km away from UIBE on the southwest side of the city.
